Arduino Agnelli Hall Androna Campo Marzio, 10 The conference presents the results of the departmental project involving researchers from all disciplinary areas, to take stock of what has been achieved and of what paths the common reflections have opened for the future research of the Department of Humanistic Studies.

Humanistic studies investigate the different ways in which the human can be read, represented, analysed in our present through a constant reference to what happened in the past. Each discipline continually revises and rethinks its own paradigms and methodologies of study, but what remains constant is an open question about what humanistic studies in each case understand as human and its transformations.

In what sense do our studies refer to the aspect of the human? How can (and should) we rethink this definition today in relation to otherness (non-human animals, the planet, artificial intelligence, the post-human, to name but a few) which the human is opposed to or with which it dialogues and interacts with?

Diving into the transformations of the human means, in fact, putting into play the different perspectives that underpin our research and our interests, the way in which they are articulated in disciplines that focus each time on the various aspects that contribute to forming the complexity of our humanity.

What human beings tell, represent, and declare of themselves, the practices and gestures they construct to form the constellation of the human itself cannot depend on unambiguous and fixed definitions once and for all, but are part of a movement made up of continuous wondering, rethinking and questioning.
